This plan is in compliance with Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Manual, Section 339.155, Florida Statute, Executive Orders 11990 and 11988, CEQ Regulations for Implementing the Procedural Provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act, and 23 CFR 771.

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1. Introduction

The Florida East Coast Corridor Transit Analysis (SFECCTA) will consider the feasibility of providing passenger transit service from the Town of Jupiter in Palm Beach County through Broward County and on to Flagler Street in the heart of Miami-Dade County's Central Business District. The study area comprises Florida's most densely populated regions where traffic congestion is growing more frustrating and costly to the many publics that regularly traverse the major coastal north-south arteries, U.S. 1, Old Dixie/Federal Highway and I-95.

Studies have shown that many commuters on those highways travel between counties for work, study, medical treatment or recreation. Recognizing the need for a regional solution, FDOT District 4 will examine alternatives within the study area. The evaluation will consider both freight and transit capacities necessary to meet the corridor's growing needs through 2030. As a successful Public Involvement Program is a vital part of the SFECCTA and of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), this Public Involvement Plan documents the community outreach program to be conducted by the Gannett Fleming Public Involvement Team.

2. Project Description

The study will require a complex balancing of existing and future freight movement with the need to identify new transit travel capacity within the corridor. Areas within the study corridor are undergoing significant redevelopment and densification which are projected to continue over the next thirty years. The South Florida Rail Corridor includes existing Tri-County Commuter Rail (Tri-Rail) service that may be complemented and enhanced by new service/connections to employment and residential centers. At the same time, the three seaports, Port of Miami, Port Everglades, and Port of Palm Beach, are focusing on the SFECC for new intermodal freight capacity, since opportunities for highway expansion are limited and roadway congestion is projected to increase.

Tier 1 of the SFECCTA will result in the identification of an initial set of transit alternatives and selection of a set of independent corridor sections. The objective will be to gain a Record of Decision from the Federal Transit Administration for each section. The study will then move forward into a more detailed Tier 2 analysis which will result in the identification and selection of one or more Locally Preferred Alternatives (LPAs) within the corridor. Multiple alternatives are likely considering the range of the study area, the existing commuter rail service, the disparity in land use densities, potentials for rationalizing freight movement, and the need to integrate and balance passenger and freight needs.

3. Background

The study area has been populated and organized into political jurisdictions for more than 100 years. During the last decade, residential and commercial development has greatly increased the density and even more new projects are under construction. The corridor presents significant mobility issues typical of major urbanized areas and has considerable local land use and transportation implications for the 28 municipalities through which it passes. Those jurisdictions are Miami, El Portal, Miami Shores, Biscayne Park, North Miami, North Miami Beach and

Aventura in Miami-Dade County; Hallandale Beach, Hollywood, Dania Beach, Fort Lauderdale, Wilton Manors, Oakland Park, Pompano Beach, Lighthouse Point and Deerfield Beach in Broward County; and Boca Raton, Delray Beach, Boynton Beach, Lantana, Lake Worth, West Palm Beach, Mangonia Park, Riviera Beach, Lake Park, North Palm Beach, Palm Beach Gardens, and Jupiter in Palm Beach County. There are also stretches of unincorporated county land within the corridor.

Due to its length of approximately 82 miles) and mix of adjacent land uses ranging from low to high density residential, industrial, and commercial development, the corridor presents a complex set of challenges requiring regional solutions. In addition, many of the municipalities are seeking to revitalize their aging commercial centers so significant *redevelopment* activity is occurring. As a result, there is a growing awareness of the need for transit options as a means of avoiding increasing traffic congestion and enhancing mobility.

4. Public Involvement Team Approach

The Gannett Fleming Team is experienced in bringing innovative techniques to the public involvement process and is also mindful of the need to limit costs because of the length and density of the study area. The team will move expeditiously by conducting concurrent efforts in the three counties and by consulting with one another so as not to duplicate efforts.

Public involvement activities in Palm Beach County will be conducted by L.B. Limited & Associates; by Kommunikatz in Broward County; and by Gladys Kidd & Associates in Miami-Dade County. Outreach to the business communities in the three counties will be conducted by Hart Consulting Group.

All team member firms are well-versed in conducting the public meetings required in this project's Scope of Services and in satisfying the public involvement requirements of the NEPA and FDOT's Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM) processes. However, beyond those fundamentals, the team brings expertise, interest and enthusiasm to this important study.

5. Public Involvement Program Goals

Within each of the three counties, the PIP's goals are to:

- Identify stakeholders and inform them of the study and of opportunities to participate in it
- Reach out to minority and low-income populations by producing materials in English, Spanish and Creole
- Encourage participation by representatives of community organizations that could benefit from enhanced public transit in the South Florida East Coast Corridor
- Educate the public by using language that is easily understood by laypersons
- Provide opportunities for interaction between stakeholders and the study's technical team
- Maintain an ongoing dialogue between stakeholders and the study team
- Meet the requirements of the NEPA/ETDM processes
- Generate awareness, consensus and support for the project.

6. Data Collection/Identification of Affected Publics

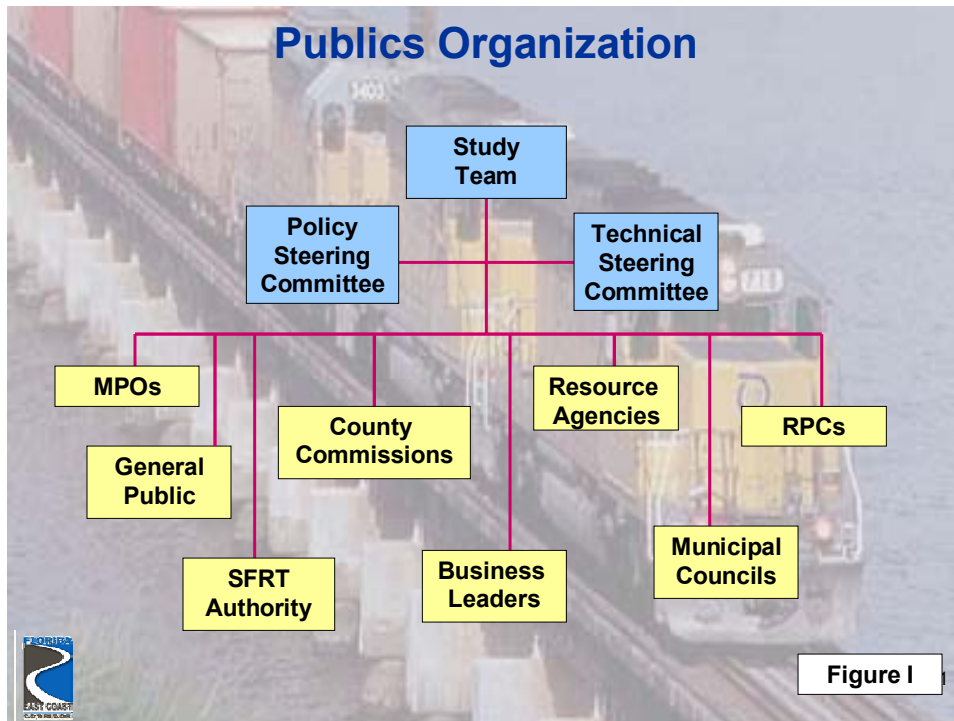
This activity commences at the outset of the project and continues throughout, as the project database will be constantly expanding to include persons as they become known to the PIP teams. Gathering of e-mail addresses and fax numbers will be critical, because mailing of all meeting notices is infeasible due to the exceptionally large number of individuals living or working within the study area. Each team member firm will gather contact information on elected officials, agencies, civic organizations, property owners and business operators within its respective county. Representatives of homeowner and community groups and major business interests within the study corridor will be identified and included in the project database.

Lists of those who use the paratransit services of the Palm Tran *Connection* in Palm Beach County; the *Transportation Options (TOPS)* program in Broward County and the *Special Transportation Service (STS)* in Miami-Dade County are not readily released. However, every effort will be made, including passing out invitation cards to those using the services, to inform them of all the public meetings.

All contact information will be entered into the project database and submitted as a deliverable by each of the Public Involvement Team member firms. In the interest of economy, the database has been limited to 300,000 contacts, or 100,000 in each county.

Figure 1 represents the organization of the project's many publics. Individuals within each group will be identified and added to the project database. Those groups are:

- Policy Steering Committee
- Technical Steering Committee
- MPOs of Miami-Dade, Broward and Palm Beach Counties
- County Commissions of the three counties
- Resource agencies
- Regional Planning Councils (two)

7. Outreach Activities

Information on the project will be presented at scheduled public meetings by the study technical team. They will be assisted by the PIP team, whose member firms will schedule meetings in their respective counties; secure meeting rooms that meet ADA access requirements; arrange for security as needed; assist in creating announcement flyers to be posted on the project website and transmitted electronically; prepare and distribute media advisories and public service announcements; prepare agendas in consultation with the technical team; staff sign-in tables; and take and distribute meeting minutes.

A. Advance Notification

Issuance of the Advance Notification is a requirement for the SFECCTA as stipulated by NEPA. The Advance Notification packet is sent by Gannett Fleming to federal, state and county officials and key staff members to alert them of the study and receive early identification of issues that should be addressed. The cover letter accompanying the packet will advise recipients that they will soon be receiving notice of an Elected Official/Agency Kickoff meeting, at which time they will be able to learn more about the project and offer comments as it begins.

B. Elected Officials/Agency Kickoff Meetings

There will be three of these meetings, one in each county. Invitations printed on project letterhead and signed by the District Secretary will be mailed to the lists compiled by each of the PIP Team member firms.

The purpose of the meetings is to acquaint elected officials and agency representatives with the project and the study team, and to explain the proposed schedule, major issues, alternatives to be considered and how their support may be needed. The meetings will begin with an informal review of project illustrations followed by a PowerPoint presentation and open discussion. Comments will be documented in meeting minutes.

This outreach is important at the beginning of the study because elected officials need to learn of the project firsthand, and not by hearing about it once it is in full swing. At some point the project may come before many of them, and these officials will be asked to endorse or support it as it moves forward. Communicating with officials of the corridor municipalities is especially critical, as they are the ones most likely to have the ear of their Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) representatives and to have concerns that will need to be addressed.

C. Public Kick-off/Scoping Meetings

There will be three of these meetings, one in each county. Notification to the general public will be in the form of an attention-getting postcard mailed to those in the project database, including the transit dependent. Newspaper advertisements will also be placed, so those who did not receive an invitation but want to be involved in the study may attend.

Representatives of federal, regional, state and local agencies with interest in or jurisdiction over the study will be notified by letter that these will also be Scoping Meetings. Scoping is required of an EIS, as noted in *40 Code of the Federal Register (CFR) Section 1501.7 (Council on Environmental Quality [CEQ] Regulations.)*

These meetings will be the first opportunity the public has to learn about the project, meet the study team, and be made aware of the proposed schedule, major issues and alternatives to be considered. The meetings will also give the study team the opportunity to learn at the outset from agency representatives and the public of significant issues or concerns that need to be addressed. The programs will begin with an informal review of project illustrations followed by a PowerPoint presentation and open discussion. Comments will be documented in meeting minutes.

D. Public Workshops

There will be ten of these workshops: four in Palm Beach County, four in Broward County and two in Miami-Dade County. A first round of meetings will be in summer 2006 and a second round in fall 2006. Newspaper advertisements in each county will announce the meetings. They will be held after there is an initial awareness of the project and after the project database has been well-developed, so it is expected that meeting flyers will also be transmitted via e-mail or group fax.

At the first round of meetings the initial set of alternatives will be presented for the public to review and offer comments. The second round will offer the alternatives as they have been refined during the course of the study, and again the public can review them and offer comments.

The meetings will begin with an informal review of project illustrations followed by a PowerPoint presentation and open discussion. Comments will be documented in meeting minutes.

E. Unscheduled Public and Agency Meetings

These meetings will be conducted by Gannett Fleming and FDOT Project Managers, and will be scheduled when requested by an agency, organization or individual.

F. Transportation Board Meetings

In each of the three counties, the MPOs and their respective subcommittees will receive three in-depth presentations during the course of the study. These will be made by Gannett Fleming and FDOT Project Managers, and will occur at the beginning, middle and toward the end of the process.

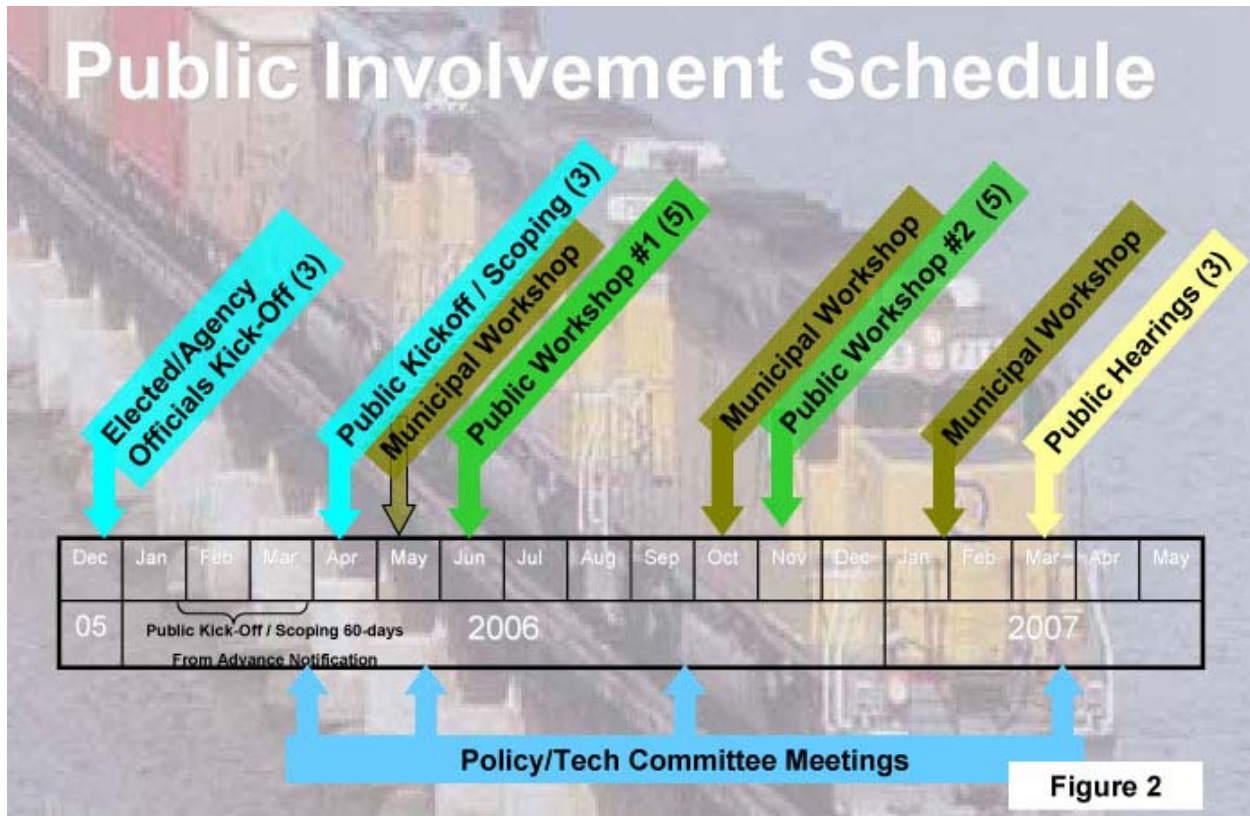
G. Municipal Workshops

Three Municipal Workshops will be held primarily for municipal mayors, managers and department directors from jurisdictions along the entire study corridor. Their purpose will be to allow interaction between these officials, and between the officials and the project technical team. The workshops will all be at a central Broward County location and will be programmed for the beginning, middle and end of the study. They will be scheduled and conducted by Gannett Fleming and FDOT project managers.

Agendas will be developed for these meetings, with the first likely to address issues such as funding, noise abatement and traffic concerns at grade crossings. The agendas for the second and third workshops will be developed from issues that arise at the earlier meetings. Presentation of station locations will likely be made at the third workshop.

The programs will begin with a formal presentation followed most likely by a general question & answer session, unless specific issues arise that warrant break-out sessions dealing with certain areas. All will conclude with a general wrap-up session.

Figure 2 is the proposed schedule for the outreach activities to elected and appointed officials, agency representatives and the general public described above.



H. Business Community

A significant aspect of the Public Involvement Program is interaction with business leaders. To keep this group informed of the study’s progress and to provide opportunities for them to give input and feedback into the study, the team will conduct business group meetings and one-on-one meetings. Leading the effort on the outreach to the business community will be the Business/Community Relations Task Leader, who will act as a liaison on behalf of the FDOT between the business community and the project participants.

The objective of this effort is to develop relationships with the business community; to identify potential interests for future development; and to determine what, if any, opportunities might be created for public-private partnerships in the form of Transit Oriented Development (TOD). The importance of developing a business base at the initiation of the project and fostering it throughout the study process cannot be overstated in terms of meeting and exceeding Federal Transit Administration (FTA) goals and objectives for New Starts applicants. The FTA places a high value on fostering a cooperative, consolidated, and coordinated base of local support from both the public and private sectors. The initiation of these relationships early in the process will not only provide necessary buy-in from potential project supporters, but will demonstrate to the FTA that the region is committed and serious about the potential New Starts project along the FEC corridor.

These objectives will be accomplished through the following elements:

i. Business Group Meetings

The Business Group Meetings will be convened subsequent to the initiation of the Public Involvement Program and will be conducted to maximize participation from the business community in Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach Counties. The meetings will include at a minimum representatives from the following:

- Fortune 500 companies and largest private employers in Tri-County area
- Major developers in Tri-County area.

Invitees to business group meetings will receive written notices including introductory information about the study and its objectives, and the process through which the FDOT is proceeding. Invitees will also be provided with a questionnaire that will enable them to provide initial feedback about the project. The survey will enable participants to provide additional information relevant to their individual business interests. Once a set of corridor proposals and recommendations has been put forth to the FDOT, business group meetings will be held to allow the business community to respond to those proposals and to provide feedback on the development of corridor options.

ii. One-on-One Meetings

The business group meetings will be supplemented with a series of one-on-one meetings with individuals from the business communities along the corridor. These one-on-one meetings will provide a means of outlining the study progress and issues, as well as providing an opportunity to begin to garner the business community support. Issues, concerns, and interests expressed by the business community during these one-on-one meetings will be summarized and presented to the study team for its use in developing proposals for the corridor. The one-on-one meetings will be chronicled in summary fashion. Depending upon releases provided by individual business leaders, quotes may be provided in these reports.

iii. **Business Involvement Database/Mailing List**

A database/ mailing list of business groups and individuals will be developed for use in establishing the business group and one-on-one meetings. This list will be presented to the FDOT for its review and approval.

iv. **Interview Summaries**

Reports will be generated subsequent to the business group meetings summarizing the issues, concerns, and interest of the attendees. To the extent possible and where confidentiality is not breached, direct statements and/or quotes from participants will be included in the reports.

I. Public Hearings

There will be five Public Hearings, two in Palm Beach County, one in Broward County and two in Miami-Dade County. Notification will be by postcard to each agency, elected official, business contact and member of the general public in the database for that county. There will be newspaper advertisements, and notices will also be transmitted electronically and posted on the project website.

Information developed to date will be presented by members of the study technical team. Members of the Public Involvement Team may assist in development of those materials to help assure they will be readily understood by laypeople.

At the Public Hearing, interested parties may seek additional information, voice their concerns or express support for various concepts. The meeting proceedings will be recorded verbatim by a court reporter. Those wishing to express opinions without speaking may fill out comment cards to be included in the public record.

As follow-up to the Public Hearings, responses will be drafted and mailed to those who filled in comment cards or asked questions which were not addressed during the meeting.

J. Media Relations

The FDOT District 4 Public Information Officer and the PIOs of the three MPOs will serve as the principal contact with and for news media throughout the tri-county study area (Miami-Dade, Broward and Palm Beach Counties). The PIP Team will develop the project media list on a county by county basis (see Appendix E), and disseminate media advisories in advance of the meeting they facilitate. The FDOT PIO will be the official spokesperson for the study.

8. Policy and Technical Committee Meetings

Both the Policy and Technical Committees will be comprised of representatives of the two FDOT Districts, three MPOs, three transit agencies, the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority and the three Leagues of Cities. The Gannett Fleming Project Manager and his firm will schedule, support and provide the necessary materials for both committees.

The representatives to the Policy Committee will be the directors of those entities named above. They will advise the technical team on comprehensive policy issues and be informed of the study's progress. This group will meet three times during this first phase of the study.

The representatives to the Technical Committee will be high level staff of the member organizations; in the case of the three Leagues of Cities, the representatives will be the chairs of the respective Transportation Committees. The Technical Committee will review and comment on the study process and technical reports and offer advice and assistance. It will meet every other month or as required.

9. Evaluation of Public Involvement Program

Members of the Gannett Fleming Public Involvement Team will exchange information on the *best practices* which emerge as the study unfolds. At the conclusion of each major activity, a close-out report will be produced which will serve as a self evaluation of the methods used and messages conveyed. Additionally, a conference call of the Public Involvement Team will occur on a quarterly basis wherein practices and methods will be evaluated.

10. Deliverables

The Gannett Fleming Public Involvement Team is well-versed in the techniques necessary to gain the attention and interest of the corridor's various and varied publics, and will employ all that are applicable for a specific activity. Following various outreach events, team members will submit reports, summaries or meeting minutes as appropriate.
